

Big Y Helpdesk David Stedman 8456



David Stedman, Stedman ONS associate, started researching DNA and Genealogy 16 years ago and first got involved with Y DNA analysis to help with genealogy in 2008 after joining the Stedman DNA project. This relied predominantly on unstable regions which were good at placing men into family groups. He then started exploring much more stable variations that could be used to help verify the former analysis but which also showed the potential for looking at ancient population movement, something which he has become extremely interested in. He has been involved with using BigY (Next Generation Sequencing) since Family Tree DNA started offering this in 2014, during which time the analysis of these types of mutations has come on in leaps and bounds. He started, and still runs, the DF49 Haplogroup project at FTDNA and having been analysing these results for over a decade there are now many examples of mutations He has found four major branches in this section of the Haplotree.

He will be available to give advice on how BigY can be used to help with genealogical problems and also answer questions on more technical aspects of Next Generation Sequencing.

In the course of his study Paul has had many a-ha moments. In this presentation he will share some of his experiences and talk about sources he has used which

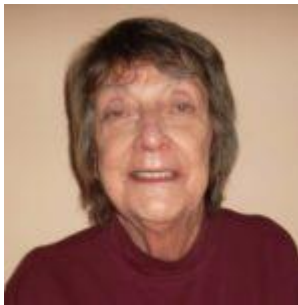
benefited his study beyond his expectations, and some, perhaps obscure, but very useful. Many, but not all, of the sources, are in the handout.

Paul joined the Guild in 2007 and registered the Howes One-Name Study 18 months later. His database at howesfamilies.com now contains over 210,000 people in reconstructed families with 4,500 Howes-related images. He was Chairman of the Guild from 2015-18 and was awarded Master Craftsman in 2018. He is a huge proponent of Guild members working together: he has conducted a marriage challenge, started the Ruby ONS, contributed data from over 35,000 marriages to Guild indexes (soon to be increased to over 50,000) and has over 250 other studies quoted as sources in his own.

An actuary by profession before retiring in 2010 and moving to Florida in 2014, Paul was a senior partner in a global consulting firm. Now a US citizen, he has lived in six countries, and worked in over fifty. Paul speaks four languages with smatterings of several others. In his other life, Paul is a keen yachtsman.
